Dear Planning Board members:

The Town of Needham Select Board (the "Petitioner") respectfully requests an amendment of Site Plan Special Permit No. 98-6 (the "Permit"), which covers the Chestnut and Lincoln Street parking lot. As the Planning Board members may be aware, three restaurants that abut the Chestnut and Lincoln Street parking lot—Hearth, Masala Art and The Farmhouse—are expected to seek permits and licenses necessary to allow seasonal outdoor seating within the existing parking area pursuant to Section 6.9.2 of the Zoning Bylaw.

The Town of Needham is the holder of easements covering the area that these three restaurants intend to use for seasonal outdoor seating, and these areas are considered part of the municipal parking lot for purposes of the Permit. In recognition of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic, and the need for our existing restaurants to find additional outdoor spaces for patrons to dine comfortably, the Town is generally supportive of the seasonal outdoor seating that these restaurants are proposing. The Permit does not, however, presently contemplate or authorize the use of parking spaces within the municipal parking lot for seasonal outdoor seating.

Accordingly, the Petitioner respectfully requests that the Planning Board approve an amendment of the Permit to allow seasonal outdoor seating to occur within the Chestnut and Lincoln Street municipal parking lot, provided that (a) such seasonal outdoor seating is conducted with the permission of the Select Board (which may, in its discretion, withdraw such permission and return all parking areas to their previously-approved state) and (b) all affected restaurants obtain the necessary permitting approval pursuant to Section 6.9.2 of the Zoning Bylaw from either the Planning Board or the Select Board, as jurisdictionally appropriate.

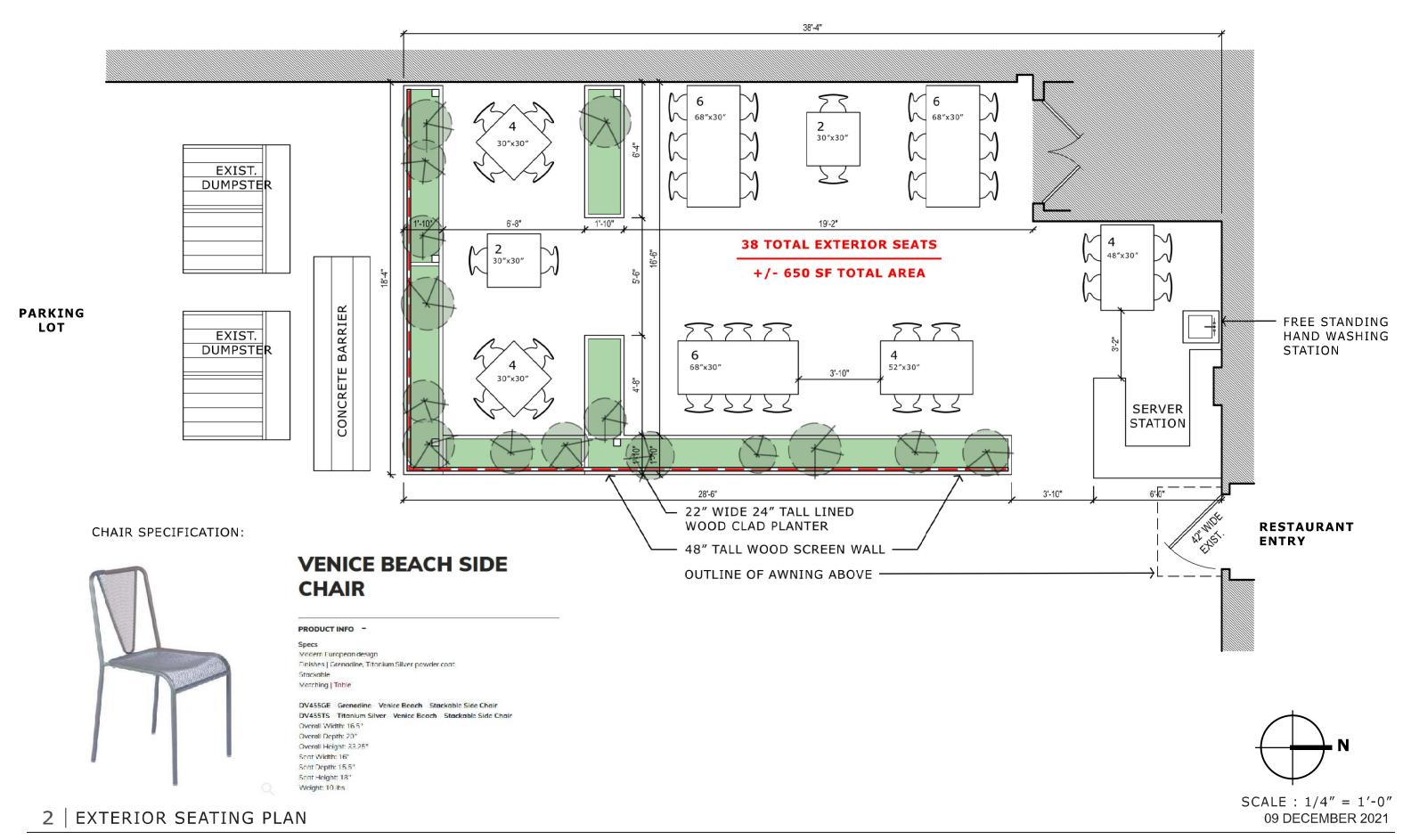

Dear Lee,

As you know, I represent J. Derenzo Properties, LLC (hereinafter "Derenzo") relative to the property at 888 Great Plain Avenue. That property is located immediately adjacent to the Center Business District and is between the Closet Exchange and the First Church of Christ Scientist. It contains approximately 23,111 square feet of land and was used and occupied for nearly 40 years by Hillcrest Gardens, a commercial landscape nursery, offering annuals, perennials, shrubs, and trees. Because the property is situated in the Single Residence B District and contains less than two and one-half acres of land, the nursery constituted a lawful, pre-existing, non-conforming use. Derenzo has continued the use but would prefer to redevelop the property for mixed use purposes, as that is more in keeping with the adjacent properties and surrounding area.

Because of its location between a commercial block and two large, church buildings, across from another commercial block, a recreational field and the YMCA complex, and in front of a commercial parking lot, the property is better suited to a mixed-use building than a single-family residential house. Moreover, because the property is over twice the minimum area required for a single-family residential house, the size also makes it more suitable for a mixed-use building than for a single-family residential house. Considering the surrounding uses and properties, it seems a bit odd that this parcel is zoned single-family.

Therefore, Derenzo asks that the parcel be rezoned, from Single Residence B to Center Business District, and that the Center Business Overlay also be extended to cover this parcel. This would extend the Center Business District to a more natural end; namely, the two large church buildings, and would be more consistent with the overall area than the current zoning. He also

asks that the side-yard setback applicable to commercial uses and buildings adjacent to residential district be amended, to allow for a setback of ten (10) feet, either by right or by special permit.

To help the Board visualize what a mixed-use building could look like, with a ten foot side yard setback, and to show what Derenzo has in mind, provided herewith please find a conceptual design set by Design Resource Team, LLC, dated August 27, 2021. Note that this design features a three-story building with underground parking, commercial and residential uses on the first floor (there are two residential units in the back) and residential use on the second and third floors. This design complies with the Center Business Overlay requirements, taking into account the special permit provisions, except with respect to the ten foot side yard setback.

Given the nature of the requested zoning change, how it fits into the downtown, and the need to address the side yard setback requirement, Derenzo would prefer if the Board would sponsor the necessary warrant article(s) if the memers agree that this rezoning makes sense and would be beneficial to the Town. To that end, we would like to discuss the request with the Board at the next available meeting.

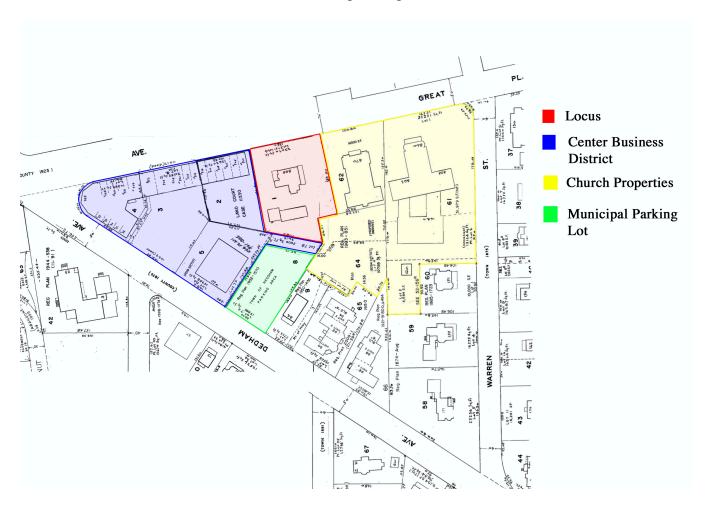

Please accept this letter as a follow up to the discussion at the recent Planning Board meeting relative to the request of my client, J. Derenzo Properties, LLC (hereinafter "Derenzo") to rezone the property at 888 Great Plain Avenue (the "Premises") to Center Business District, with the Center Business District Overlay, and to change the applicable side yard setback. In particular, this letter is intended to address some of the questions that arose relative to setbacks and clarify why relief is needed relative thereto.

Assuming the Premises is rezoned as Center Business with the Center Business Overlay, the applicable setbacks would be as follows:

Front – Pursuant to Section 4.4.4, properties in the Center Business District have a minimum front setback of "three (3) feet or a setback consistent with the average of the setbacks of the two adjacent buildings, whichever is smaller".

Pursuant to Section 3.4.8.1(c), under the Overlay, the minimum front setback is reduced to 0 and a maximum setback is imposed; "the lesser of 3 feet from the front property line, or the average setback of existing buildings within 100 feet on the same side of the street as the proposed development".

Side and Rear – Pursuant to Section 4.4.8.3, "where a lot in a Center Business District adjoins a residential district, no building or structure for *business use* shall be placed or constructed within fifty (50) feet of the residential district boundary, and within said strip, the twenty-five (25) feet closest to the district boundary shall be suitably landscaped per specifications outlined below, and there shall be no accessory use. The remaining twenty-five (25) feet may be used for an accessory use not including a building or structure" (emphasis added). Furthermore, because the use table at Section 3.2.2 only allows residential apartments on the second floor and in the half-

story directly above second floor, this means that under the "base" zoning in the Center Business District, the first floor for any new building at the Premises could not be closer than 50 feet to the left side line adjoining a residential district.

Under the Overlay, the situation is much the same. Pursuant to Section 3.4.8.1(e), in the Overlay, the side and rear yard setbacks for properties adjoining a residential district are 50 feet, regardless of the use of the structure. As a result, assuming the Premises is rezoned Center Business with the Overlay, under both sets of requirements, the first floor of any new building would have to be located at least 50 feet from the left property line, as it would adjoin a residential district. The only difference would be that under the "base" zoning, the second floor and half story above could extend to 25 feet from the left property line, provided they were used solely for residential use. But as illustrated by the first design, this would result in a somewhat unusual building, out of character with the area and the design goals for the Center Business District.

As a result, and after consultation with Planning staff and others, we propose a zoning change to allow for a reduction in the applicable setback down to 10 feet. This might be accomplished in two ways. First, with an outright change to the applicable setback requirements. Second, with the creation of a new special permit mechanism to allow for reduction of the setback requirements based on certain criteria, such as, the nature of adjacent properties, the surrounding area, and the proposed development. Given that changing the setback requirements outright might have unintended consequences in other zoning districts, a special permit mechanism might be simpler and could be limited to just the Center Business District.

We look forward to continuing the discussion concerning the requested zoning change at the Board's meeting on December 7.

Members of the Board:

As noted above, we reside at 92 Dedham Avenue, one of the townhouses adjacent to the parking lot that abuts the rear of the subject property. At this time, we oppose the proposed zoning change as requested by J. Derenzo Properties for the subject property.

Although we would not necessarily oppose some form of development for this property, we believe the current proposal is inappropriate in two aspects. First, we believe that extension of the Center Business District onto the subject property is both inappropriate and inconsistent with the nature of the surrounding properties. The current natural boundary of the Center Business District is the extension of Pickering street. Adding this property would place the Center Business District directly adjacent to the Christian Science church and directly across from one of the few open spaces remaining in this neighborhood. Unlike the Hillcrest Gardens pre-existing nonconforming use, the proposed new use would radically change the character of the property. Hillcrest Gardens enhanced the neighborhood by bringing in landscaped green space and natural light. The proposed development would do nothing to enhance the neighborhood.

Second, the proposed development is a massive one on a relatively small lot. The front part of the development covers almost 100% of the lot (approximately 15,427 s.f. with most of the uncovered area of the 23,111 s.f. lot being in the rear of the development in an irregular area adjacent to the parking lot). Given the 3-story height of the structure and its proposed construction with only a 10' side setback, it will be an overwhelming structure jammed immediately next to and blocking any light to the church. What is currently an open space buffer between the current commercial Center Business District and the residential area will become a commercial encroachment overshadowing everything else in the surrounding neighborhood.

We urge you not to support this proposed project as currently conceived and further urge the Board not to pursue a zoning change for the property on behalf of the developer.

I was able to listen to the meeting last night and wanted to voice my concerns regarding the rezoning of the parcel at 888 Great Plain Ave. I grew up in Concord MA, a town with a very clear perspective on the role of the town center, and how that needs to function, as well as what it needs to look like. I feel before we jump to arbitrary decisions on if it should be commercially zoned or not, we should step back and ask ourselves what we want our town center to look like, and how we want it to function. If that is written down somewhere I'd appreciate being pointed to it. If not, I propose we take a moment to get clear on that first.

Secondly, there was also a comment made that we need more housing. I'd like to better understand that. From my perspective we are packed in this town, our lots getting smaller and smaller and our schools bursting at the seams. Why do we "need" more housing? Is it for tax reasons? If so let's solve that other ways, Or is it really that we need diversity of housing in which case I'd argue any residential elements we consider for that space be specifically low income. We do not need more \$1M+ housing options and the current guid of 10% low income in new development is not enough to offset that overall problem.

Lastly, without the clarity on the role of our town center etc, my initial reaction is I'd like to see that land re-zoned for commercial use -- BUT ONLY with the understanding that the house that is on that land be restored and used as part of the commercial endeavor. I understand this is limiting the profit potential for various parties and so perhaps the town could find a way to help with that. I am very concerned about that garage entrance and what that does to the feeling of that part of town. I write to express my opposition to the development of the property at 888 Great Plain Ave as it was proposed at the Planning Board meeting of November 16, 2021. Before moving ahead with any development of the project feedback should be solicited widely, with particular attention given to the immediate neighbors and abutters.

The primary reason I am opposed to the current proposal is that the entryway/driveway is on Great Plain Avenue. With 39 spaces underground we should expect vehicles entering and exiting throughout the day. In a high (pedestrian and auto) traffic area such a driveway is *extremely dangerous*. The proposed entryway crosses a high-traffic sidewalk. Indeed, with two churches and a highly used field directly across the street, pedestrian traffic is heavy. (Visit Greene's Field on any weekend between March and November and there are literally hundreds of people on the field. These folks cross the street to Needham House of Pizza and Abbott's Ice Cream, to name but two popular businesses, on a consistent basis.) Visibility at the existing crosswalks is already limited given the on-street parking. Adding a busy driveway to Great Plain Avenue increases the danger to drivers and pedestrians. I encourage the owner/designer to work to develop a plan that puts the entry/driveway BEHIND THE BUILDING.

This addresses my second point regarding the entryway: such a design is inconsistent with the current commercial district. No other business on that or the adjoining block (including the churches zoned Residential) has a driveway/vehicle entrance on Great Plain Avenue. (This is true for both sides of the street.) This was undoubtedly done because *entrances on Great Plain increase the danger to people and drivers*. Furthermore, vehicle entrances on Great Plain are an eyesore. Given that more than *two hours* was given to discussing the beautification of town center (Needham's "front door", to quote Needham Parks and Forestry's Mr. Olsen at the meeting of Nov 16), it would seem that any plan for 888 Great Plan ought to consider the bigger picture. Is the proposed plan for 888 GPA in line with the town's goals regarding visual appeal?

No.

The "front door" that Needham is working hard to build will be marred by a building that is three stories tall and set too close to the sidewalk and abutting church.

In short, the proposed design for 888 GPA is dangerous and inconsistent with Needham's beautification goals.

Thank you for the opportunity to provide input about the proposed zoning change regarding the property at 888 Great Plain Avenue and about the proposed structure.

We are the owners/residents of the residence located at 94 Dedham Avenue. Ours is one of five residential units (The Miller Green Condominiums). Our unit sits on the edge of the municipal parking lot, and is the closest of the five units to the proposed structure. We are, in essence, abutters, since our unit is separated from the proposed building only by the town parking lot. We will be affected by the occluded view, the noise, the lighting, the pollution and the loss of sunlight and open, green space. We are opposing several features in this proposal not only because of its impact on us personally, but also how it affects the quality of life in the downtown area.

We are in favor of providing additional housing (especially affordable housing) close to the center of Needham. However, we have several concerns about this project, which we enumerate below:

- 1) The proposed structure would fill the entire space with a three-story cube structure with no "green" features, occluding both airflow and sunlight, casting shadows on the adjacent buildings. There is no permeable ground cover, thereby increasing storm water run-off and heat generation. Further, there is no green or open space in the plan; no oxygen-replenishing trees, shrubbery or other planted areas. The plan eliminates all current sources of food, protection and nesting space for the birds and small mammals that live and reproduce in this area. A variance that would allow a 10-foot setback only intensifies these concerns, and is unacceptable. In other projects, the town planners have indicated that they value light, open, airy spaces, and this project is antithetical to that ideal.
- 2) this plan will Increase the number of cars in town, which increases noise and pollution. (A single typical passenger vehicle emits about 4.6 metric tons of carbon dioxide per year.) Traffic entering and exiting the property will further congest traffic on Great Plain Avenue. Vehicles must cross a sidewalk in the process, which endangers pedestrians and bikers. Delivery trucks will undoubtedly use the lot behind the property to deliver their goods, adding to the noise, pollution and traffic. We've repeatedly witnessed this problem at the relatively new combined-use building located two doors from us at 50 Dedham Avenue. Fewer units and fewer cars would reduce this problem.
- 3) It was not clear at the Tuesday night (Nov. 16th) meeting or in the documents if there was a provision for affordable housing, or for units with handicapped access, or accessible spaces for vehicles used by residents with disabilities.
- 4) We have concerns about introducing many more exterior lights to the neighborhood, and the probability that these will be high intensity, bright white bulbs which are visually intrusive. In

the interests of safety, these lights will probably burn throughout the night, not only shining into our windows, but also contributing to light pollution that causes disruptions in patterns of bird migration. We encourage the developers to consider mitigation strategies (e.g., no flood lights, warm light bulbs at the lowest lumens possible to achieve the goals of the lighting; motion-generated lighting, down-lighting vs. up-lighting to reduce the impact of artificial night lights on birds, etc.).

In summary, we encourage the Board not to allow this project to move forward unless and until the issues raised above (as well as those concerns raised by other citizens) are addressed and resolved. We strongly urge you not to allow a zoning change that would reduce the side setback to 10 feet. Further, the developers should be asked to submit a landscaping plan that would address the issues raised above in item #1.

Thank you for your service to our community. I am writing on behalf of my fellow members of the Housing Working Group of Equal Justice Needham. We are an informal group with a mission to *Remedy past discrimination and current housing crisis by increasing housing choice & accessibility of affordable housing in Needham.* In service of the mission, we seek to better understand challenges and opportunities by collaboratively working with town leadership and other representative groups. It is in that spirit that I write today.

The purpose of the letter is to share some ideas and feedback related to the proposed development at 888 Great Plain Ave. Here is our current understanding based on documents and discussion shared at the <a href="https://doi.org/10.1007/journal.o

- All ideas presented are preliminary and were shared by the new property owner to inform the community and encourage input.
- J. Derenzo Properties, LLC, the new owner of the property at 888 Great Plan Ave. shared preliminary interest in 1) developing the property for mixed use purposes and 2) seeking approval for the zoning to be changed from single family to central business district or a special permit to allow for such a development.
- A concept was shared of a mixed use development to include "a three-story building with underground parking, commercial and residential uses on the first floor (there are two residential units in the back) and residential use on the second and third floors." The initial estimate is for 3 retail units; 24 residential units (mix of one to three bedrooms); and 39 below grade parking spaces.

We strongly support development of additional housing units in the CBD but only if they add significant numbers of truly affordable units. At first blush, the preliminary proposal does neither. Based on the current affordable housing unit target of 12.5%, only 2-3 units would be available and it is doubtful they'd be truly affordable. For example, a recent presentation by housing experts hosted by the Needham League of Women Voters highlighted how few of Needham public employees and school personnel can afford to live here without spending significantly more than 30% of household income. And market rents for Chapter 40B developments range from \$2,600-\$4,200 for Charles River Landing and \$2,200-\$5,000 at The Kendrick. The one-and two-bedroom units at the Modera Needham are starting at \$3,200 and \$3,600, respectively. Two-bedroom units in older buildings are at least \$1,900 which would require an income of approximately \$84,000.

We believe that at least 10 units of affordable housing should be created at the 888 Great Plain sight with an affordability index that is more realistic and accurate such as 65% of AMI. We also ask the Planning Board to consider that site in the context of nearby properties such as the First Baptist Church which recently voted to develop a plan to close. Alternatively, you might encourage a development similar to the 6 townhomes built at 17 High Street (but made more affordable for rent or purchase.) We are also asking the Housing Plan Working Group to consider this type of property as part of the new affordable housing plan and suggest that the Planning Board not act on this property without sufficient input from that group.

Thank you for considering our initial input. We look forward to working with you on this and other planning/zoning considerations in support of your responsibilities to guide the physical growth and development of Needham in a coordinated and equitable manner.

Adding a 3-story plain box filling such an important lot, edge to edge, is exactly what we do NOT need in Town. We are not the Seaport or Manhattan – and although the comparison may seem laughable, what the plans here have in common is building out of scale to the neighborhood, blocking views and light, being unwelcome to walking, and creating a closed-in, urban feel to a Town whose charm needs to be **enhanced**, not undermined.

While I am sorry to see the wonderful open, landscaped green space of Hillcrest Gardens disappear, I understand this is private property and valuable. Your job as the Planning Board is to protect the Town from development which is counterproductive. I frequently walk by this lot on my way to Needham house of pizza, Abbot's, and Harvey's. It's been sad to see this vibrant lot, so close to the downtown, go dormant lately.

I was so excited, then, when I heard there was a possibility that housing could be built on the site! I would love having more neighbors around, and the idea of twenty four more families living near me. I'm also excited by the idea that these residents, like me, could drive less than most Needhamites, because of close access to the 59 bus and the commuter rail, and by virtue of being within easy walking distance to many restaurants and churches and the playground and hospital, and a further walk from two grocery stores. Allowing more people to live as close to town as I do, then, encourages environmentally friendly modes of transport and supports our climate goals.

Hillcrest Gardens have always been a commercial retail enterprise, even if they were legally zoned as residential. I look forward to new retail being established in the same lot, and I support the rezoning to allow this to happen.

My one concern is the excessive amount of parking included in this plan. Why do 24 residential units need 39 parking spaces? I wanted to express my support toward the effort being made for the proposal of additional rental with some affordable housing in Needham at the former location of Hillcrest Gardens. I am a lifelong resident of Needham and I was raised on Great Plain Ave just outside Needham Center. I stayed in town to raise my four now grown children, though I have exclusively rented for my adult life. My oldest and her husband are expecting their first and also renting in Needham. They have both made their careers working with special needs children in therapy and education, and hope to stay in Needham to raise their children.

There is a real shortage of rentals in Needham, as well as a very high demand for them. The center is an ideal location since the traffic patterns there have already been forged, and because it is not in anyone's direct "back yard".

Dear Members of the Working Group,

We are unable to attend the Public Education and Listening Session scheduled for January 27th, but wanted to submit a concern about affordable housing in Needham.

We have been supportive of Family Promise Metrowest, and their work with families with housing instability. One of their clients is a single mother with a child enrolled in the Eliot Elementary School. They moved to Needham about 15 months ago, and were able to find an apartment (with the advocacy of Family Promise) that was below the market rate, at \$1800 a month. Unfortunately, the landlord has informed her that they are repurposing the unit and they will have to move out in March 2022. All efforts to find another affordable 2 bedroom apartment in Needham, a community that they have grown to love, have been fruitless. She would be unable to afford anything over \$2000 a month if utilities are included, yet 2 bedroom apartments are currently renting for a minimum of \$2500+ a month.

She is not eligible for a state-approved affordable unit because her income is above the poverty level. She completed a Master's degree the previous year when they lived in a Family Promise residence, but since she is in the beginning her career, would be considered 'working poor'. This family is an asset to Needham, adding to our racial and economic diversity, and they value the quality of education from our public schools.

We want the Working Group to consider moderate priced rental stock as one of its priorities. Needham cannot be an elite community only affordable to the rich, with some public housing or affordable units to those with limited income. It needs to include people from all walks of life with a range of financial assets in order to thrive. As homeowners in Needham Heights, we have been dismayed over the last decade to see the destruction of entire streets (specifically Dale, Birch, Bobsled, and Andrea) and over 25 houses in our immediate area that once were modest homes for rent or sale, only to be replaced with huge townhouse condos that sell for over a million dollars. Preserving and increasing affordable housing options for moderate income families must be a priority of the Working Group.

Thank you for your consideration and work on updating Needham's Housing Plan.

Dear Chairman Alpert, Mr. Block, Mr. Jacobs, Ms. McKnight, and Ms. Espada:

I am writing regarding the proposed zoning change for 888 Great Plain Avenue – the former site of Hillcrest Gardens. I understand the symmetry that would occur in changing the zoning for this property from "residential" to "commercial. However, I would like to bring forward the following concerns:

- 1. I do not support the accommodation to the applicant of changing the side setback to 10 feet, from 50 feet. Side setbacks are in place for a reason, and in this situation, I feel that a minimum 50 foot side setback is appropriate. The two churches on this block provide a beautiful gateway into Needham Center. It would be a shame to have a large residential building with storefronts overshadow and crowd these churches. I am sorry that the existing side setback requirement makes the applicant's plans for this site more difficult to achieve, but I don't believe this is a reason to grant this exception, particularly since this setback requirement was known, or should have been known when the property was purchased.
- 2. I am looking forward to hearing the findings and recommendations of the Housing Plan Working Group. I believe the intent of this group is to take a big picture approach to addressing housing needs in Needham, rather than making changes on an individual or piecemeal basis. I believe that making zoning changes to individual parcels of land just before this committee has had the opportunity to make their recommendations should be done only under extraordinary conditions, which I don't believe this situation qualifies for. Once again, the applicant knew, or should have known that this property was zoned "residential" when it was purchased, and likely even knew about the work being done by the Housing Plan Working Group. To expect to vault over this process does not seem appropriate to me.

I believe that there is the potential for other concerns with this development. Specifically the impact on traffic and parking on Great Plain Avenue and surrounding areas, the preservation of green space, and the impact on the surrounding community. However, I will wait to address these when more definitive plans have been established. I understand that there will be a public hearing regarding these zoning changes, but I would suggest that the solicitation of public input may be helpful in this process before the board makes a recommendation based exclusively on meeting with the applicant.

I am writing to express my support of the proposed project to build a building encompassing multi-dwelling units and retail space at 888 Great Plain Avenue.

While not an abutter to this property, I am a neighborhood resident and I can see the back of the home sited on the lot from my home. I am a Needham resident of 20 years and have owned two homes in town in years past. I now currently rent on Dedham Avenue.

I am in favor of the added rental housing at market rate that this property will provide, and hope that there might be the possibility of a 40(b) unit or units.

As you know, this property has historically been a commercial property (Hillcrest Gardens, in business for more than 20 years.) That the property would now revert, as some might wish, to a single family dwelling located between the businesses and parking lot to the west/south and the houses of worship to the east, seems rather odd as the entire block on both sides of the street is either commercial use or town owned public use.

Should the size of the proposed building be reduced significantly, I am quite concerned that Needham won't get the additional rental units that are sorely needed here. It was exciting to see that the downtown redevelopment plan included the idea of including apartments atop commercial use space. Needham has a wonderful downtown that is also a neighborhood. Let's enhance this! Walking to restaurants, shops and the train = reduced emissions and healthier residents getting in their needed daily steps!

Reducing the size and scale of the proposed building will, I fear, mean making the units more expensive to turn a profit - perhaps they would need to be condominiums in that case - and for sale at a price point that would shut out those of us who are looking for rental and purchasing options in Needham that don't require six figure salary (or dual income) to reasonably afford.

Concerns about added traffic and the safety of pedestrians have been raised. I feel strongly that there are ways of addressing this with lighted and sound beacons similar to those currently used in the condominium building across from First Parish. Given that this property abuts the municipal parking lot, perhaps there would be a way to have residents' cars exit the property in the back through that lot?

Other concerns raised have to do with the elimination of green space. Given the proximity of this parcel to Green's Field directly across the street, the Town Common a block away and Memorial Field several blocks away, that argument seems farfetched. We have only seen an initial rendering of the building. Perhaps there would be a way to incorporate plantings, a small courtyard, rooftop and/or wall gardens that would bring added plant life to the property.

I hope that you will give this project serious consideration and not fall victim to the "NIMBY" argument of "too big, too much, too commercial." I believe that the benefits to our community that this building would bring far outweigh the downsides.

I might add that I have a feeling that the former owner of Hillcrest Gardens might be happy to see this parcel create opportunities for retirees on limited incomes, young people just starting out and single parents (like myself) and others continue to call Needham their home. Not everyone can afford \$1 million or more to live here.

I hope you will take into consideration the needs of all Needham residents and work with the developer to come up with a plan for this property that brings the downtown development vision into reality.

I want to let you know that I am adamantly opposed to the request to rezone 888 Great Plain Avenue in order for Derenzo Properties to build an oversized commercial property in a residential neighborhood. The proposed plan to expand the commercial center of the town into a residential area is unacceptable. 888 Great Plain Avenue is part of a residential area with lots of pedestrian activity. Kids are constantly walking "uptown" along Great Plain Avenue from the neighborhoods east of town and, for most of the year, there is a constant flow of kids across Great Plain Avenue from Greene's Field for pizza and ice cream. Additional traffic in this area will be hazardous for all. Hillcrest Gardens was able to operate on this property because nurseries have been able to operate in residential zones. It was a reasonable solution 20 plus years ago because it maintained the existing traditional home and property setbacks, had minimal traffic, and the owners worked hard to create a space that was an attractive addition to the neighborhood. First, the prices of these new homes are out of reach for most families who are both working and trying to raise children, especially families who are anything but white and privileged. The second serious issue with these teardowns is the lack of green space remaining on these lots. As we all know, green space is extremely important for the environment, as well as for maintaining the picturesque look of Needham.

This background is relevant to the proposed project at 888 Great Plain Avenue. My family recently moved to 67 Fair Oaks Park when we outgrew our house on Wilshire Park. We have 2 gigantic and very active boys, ages 8 and 11. They love living on a quiet street where they can walk to town so easily and safely. We all do. We walk to CVS, New Leaf, Abbott's, Walgreens, Harvey's and the restaurants downtown. I feel fortunate that I can let my boys bike and walk to town and not worry about their safety. My husband and I love to walk our dog all around the blocks surrounding our house, including the block where 888 Great Plain Avenue is located.

The plans for the building at 888 Great Plain Avenue concern me. First of all, I am concerned about introducing additional traffic near an already busy intersection. Second, I am worried about the continued depletion of our green spaces and I am adamantly opposed to making an exception to any set back requirements. These set back requirements are in place for a number of good reasons: 1) they are critical to maintaining the appearance of our town, 2) they help to keep pedestrians safe, 3) they preserve our green space, 4) maintaining enough space for access by fire trucks and other emergency vehicles, 5) providing space between buildings for light and fresh air to get into the buildings, and 6) ensuring properties do not fall on top of each other in the case of natural disaster. In summary, setback requirements provide us with "breathing room" between buildings. See Landcentral, Property Setbacks: What Are They and Why Do They Matter?, available at https://blog.landcentral.com/land-university-blog/property-setbacks-what-are-they-and-why-do-they-matter/ (last visited January 17, 2022).

I am also concerned about another tear down that would introduce a very modern looking structure into a historic and quaint downtown, thereby diminishing the aesthetic appeal of the town. It would also unnecessarily extend the downtown area into a residential zone. Lastly, we already have a number of vacant storefronts due to the pandemic, we clearly do not need any more stores in Needham right now. Empty storefronts are depressing to look at and hurt the local economy.

If this project goes forward, the developer should not be granted any exemptions to the building requirements and should do everything possible to make the building blend into the look of the town, which is historic and lovely.

I am writing to oppose the plans for 888 Great Plain Avenue. I live nearby with my wife and family and we are concerned about this development negatively affecting downtown Needham and the nearby neighborhood.

My wife and I moved to Needham 12 years ago because we loved the look of the town. To us the "charm" of Needham includes the following: (1) there is space between houses, (2) the houses and buildings are set back from the street, (3) the downtown area is homogeneous in its appearance and picturesque.

We recently moved 2 blocks away from the proposed development. My 2 boys play baseball and football constantly outside as we share a front lawn with a family that also has young children. We all feel safe walking or biking to town and my children continue to play on Green's field, across the street from the development. I am concerned about this mixed commercial and residential property bringing additional traffic to downtown to an already crowded area and through the side streets nearby like ours. In addition, I worry about the effect of this large development, which will reduce the amount of greenspace in downtown Needham and affect the aesthetics of the neighborhood

As you are aware the proposal will require a waiver of the setback requirements. These setback requirements exist for a reason. While we too found them inconvenient for us when we tried to modify a mudroom, we respected that the building codes in Needham are designed to preserve what we love about Needham. I live just around the corner from 888 Great Plain Ave and I am not supportive of this proposal for several reasons.

Commerciality

- 1. The plan extends the **commerciality** (it's too commercial) of Needham town center right onto 2 of the prettiest New England churches. I am emailing you about the proposed development for 888 Great Plain Ave and the proposed zoning changes for that development.

I am a 36 year resident of Needham and have thus seen the developement of Needham Center over the many years, in both good and difficult times.

One of the charms of our town center is that the shops/restaurants are in a tightly clustered area. For the most part those shops are well patronized. It is those that are on the farthest reaches of the central commercial area that tend to falter/fail. We too often have seen these business come and go due to lack of business. The proposed plan for the space at 888 Great Plain Avenue falls into that less travelled/ patronized area, and thus is already predisposed to being unsuccessful. We obviously already have too many commercially spaces, as several are currently vacant. Even before the pandemic, many of these spaces were empty and thus to make an assumption that these will be filled post pandemic is very difficult to justify. This I truly question the financial viability of the proposal. Yet, once 888 Great Plain Ave is converted to comercial/residential space as proposed, there is no reversing that conversion.

Secondly, in this person's humble opinion the proposed building is simply extremely ugly. It appears as a looming structure, with a very dark walkway under the overhang. There is absolutely nothing warm or welcoming about its appearance. The lack of any setback only exacerbates the ominous looming nature of it. Needham has done done a great job thus far with these cluster residential spaces - ie condos etc-; this is an enormous fall from those standards. It will stand out like a sore thumb!

I also agree with those who are concerned about the disregard for the importance of green space in our town center. If any development is to be done in that space it should be in such a way that preserves the respect and importance of natural and architectural beauty in Needam center, to prevent it from becoming just another sprawling commercial district.

For these reasons I am very much oppposed to the proposed plan and hope that the Planning Board will not give its approval.

NEEDHAM PLANNING BOARD MINUTES

September 21, 2021

The Needham Planning Board Virtual Meeting using Zoom was remotely called to order by Adam Block, Vice-Chairman, on Tuesday, September 21, 2021, at 7:15 p.m. with Mr. Jacobs and Mmes. McKnight and Espada, as well as Planning Director, Ms. Newman.

Mr. Block took a roll call attendance of the Board members and staff. He noted this is an open meeting that is being held remotely because of Governor Baker's executive order on March 12, 2020 due to the COVID Virus. All attendees are present by video conference. He reviewed the rules of conduct for zoom meetings. He noted this meeting does include a public hearing and there will be public comment allowed. If any votes are taken at the meeting the vote will be conducted by roll call. All supporting materials are posted on the town's website.

Public Hearing:

7:20 p.m. – Major Project Site Plan Special Permit: 2021-03: Needham Nutrition LLC, 915 Great Plain Avenue, Needham, MA, Petitioner (Property located at 915 Great Plain Avenue, Needham, MA). Regarding proposal to occupy approximately 864 square feet of existing first floor commercial space to operate a business selling Smoothies, Protein Shakes, Energy Drinks, Immune Booster Drinks, Collagen Drinks, Fitness Drinks, and similar items for consumption on and off the premises.

Upon a motion made by Mr. Jacobs, and seconded by Ms. McKnight, it was by a roll call vote of the four members present unanimously:

VOTED: to waive the reading of the public hearing notice.

Evans Huber, attorney for the applicant, noted this is a 3 unit building at the corner of Great Plain Avenue and Pickering Street. The applicant proposes to occupy the left side and they are here to seekfor a parking waiver. The previous occupant was retail and required 3 parking spaces. The applicant proposes to open retail that serves protein, energy drinks and such. Take—out requires 10 spaces. There will be a small retail component that would require 3 spaces. There will be 7 seats inside which would require 3 spaces for a total of 16 spaces. This is an increase of 13 spaces over the previous use. There will only be interior renovations and no façade change. Mr. Huber noted the other 2 tenants received waivers for parking. There are 2 or 3 spaces in back but there is not sufficient parking for any tenant occupants.

Mr. Huber stated the starting hours of operation would be Monday through Friday 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and Saturday 10:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m. There may be longer hours to 6:00 p.m. on Saturday as it grows. There will be 2 to 3 staffstaff, but the business may need 4 if successful. He would requesting 10:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. on Saturday with 4 staff to prevent having to come back if the business is successful. The applicant will get municipal parking stickers for his staff. Mr. Huber reviewed the reliefwaivers being requested – a Special Permit for further Site Plan Review, a Special Permit to allow a business in the Center Business District most closely described as retail sales of ice cream, frozen yogurt, etc., a Special Permit to allow more than one use on a lot and a Special Permit to waive strict adherence to the off-street parking requirements.

The applicant anticipates most <u>patrons</u> will already be <u>in Needham Centerthere</u> shopping or working and the business will be mostly pedestrian oriented. There is no proposed signage yet. There is substantial on street parking on Great Plain Avenue, Pickering Street, and the municipal parking lots. Mr. Huber stated he believes the criteria for the waiver requests has been met. Mr. Block noted the following correspondence for the record: 2 letters from Attorney Huber dated 8/13/21 and 8/20/21, emails from the Fire Department and Police Department with no comments and an email from the Board of Health with comments. She asked Mr. Huber if he had seen them. He has, and <u>he</u> noted the <u>Health Department</u> comments were relating to dumpsters and grease traps if appropriate. No grease will be used but there will be a need for a recycling dumpster. The applicant will make arrangements for a recycling receptacle and to share the current dumpster. Adilson Pires, applicant, stated he will probably install a grease trap but does not deal with grease.

Ms. McKnight stated there are 3 parking spaces on the property and asked if they are allocated to the other tenants or in the permits. Ken Mackin, property owner, stated 2 spaces are allocated to the Karate Studio and one to the dentist. Ms. McKnight asked what the prior retailer was. Mr. Huber noted Mostly Gray Boutique, a clothing store. Ms. McKnight noted parking along the street and asked where a handicapped person would park. Mr. Mackin stated there are no handicap metered spaces on Great Plain Avenue nor any on Pickering Street. He noted the nearest would be Walgreen's parking lot. He is not aware if the town has any. Ms. McKnight noted the town is considering putting forward an expansion of outdoor seating. It may be that the Select Board might allow more outdoor seating in this block. Is there any expectation for outdoor seating? Mr. Pires stated he does not really see it. People would probably take their beverageit to go or go to the park. It would be nice, but the layout would make it difficult. Mr. Block asked if the current dumpster iswas screened and was informed it iswas. He asked how it was screened. Mr. Mackin stated there is an offset adjacent to the bulkhead at the rear of the property. Mr. Block asked if screening was a requirement. Ms. Newman noted they have required a wood fence in the center with a door. Mr. Mackin stated he has owned the building since 2014 and has had no complaints or issues.

Upon a motion made by Mr. Jacobs, and seconded by Ms. Espada, it was by a roll call vote of the four members present unanimously:

VOTED: to close the hearing.

Ms. Newman will draft an affirmative decision for the 10/5/21 meeting. The Board will vote the relief then.

Bonnie Shuer - Request to discuss Development in Needham and Preserving Trees.

Mr. Block noted correspondence from Bonnie Shuer regarding removal of trees. Ms. Shuer, of 37 Richard Road, stated she has lived in Needham 47 years. Needham has always preserved its assets and updated buildings. A major practice is to tear down old houses and replace with new ones. Progress is necessary and keeps Needham desirable. Most sites are clear cut and leveled of trees and greenery – a practice easy for builders but bad for Needham. There needs to be respect and preservation of open spaces. The town cannot allow older growth trees to be taken down. This creates a buffer between properties and provides oxygen. When trees are removed there should be a requirement the trees be replanted. The town should have By-Laws to maintain green spaces. It is in the <u>Town's</u> best interests to safeguard trees. In her neighborhood 7 acres of trees were lost for 9 houses. There should be a tree beautification fee.

Ms. Shuer stated she talked with several town employees and Ed Olson is the closest thing to an arborist. She feels builders should pay a fee or replant berms in town. There should be more renovations of existing homes. With only million dollar homes being built the town is not accessible to all. Having homes for young families and downsizing seniors is a worthy goal. The Select Board has 3 related goals for 2021-2022. This shows the town is concerned. She hopes the Board will give careful thought to their requirements and reconsider a tree by-law. There needs to be an end to the destructive removal of trees. She thanked the Board for listening.

Mr. Block noted the following correspondence for the record: an email from Bonnie Shuer; an email from Jenny Small; an email from Stacy Blasberg and an email from Beverly Schwartz. He noted a Tree By-Law is a matter of a general by-law and the Select Board is the Board of jurisdiction. He suggested Ms. Shuer reach out to the Select Board. He also suggested this be discussed at the Chair/Vice-Chair meeting with the Select Board to see what is possible. He noted steps that would need to be taken to put this forward and financially support the endeavor. Mr. Jacobs did not think there was a reason the Planning Board could not advertise and hold a hearing on this even if the goal is not zoning. Ms. Newman agreed the Board could hold a hearing. She noted a draft Tree By-Law was developed over a number of years and then other priorities came along and it was dropped.

Mr. Block stated he would discuss this with the Chair and then at the Select Board Chair/Vice-Chair meeting to see who wants to hold a hearing. Ms. McKnight stated she remembers a meeting where Tree Warden Ed Olson was in attendance and the concept was discussed. It got bogged down with concern that it would be a lot of work for the town staffstaff, and she felt discouraged. She is encouraged by what Ms. Shuer said and that the Select Board has it on their goals. She feels the Board got discouraged a couple of years ago and let it go. Ms. Shuer commented she is pleased by the response tonight. She feels there has to be some way to hold people responsible for removing old growth trees that do not need to come out. Ms. Espada noted an environmental group being put together as a committee for the Town. This may be good for that group. Mr. Block thanked Ms. Shuer for bringing this forward to the Board.

<u>Planning Board Recommendations on zoning articles for the October 2021 Special Town Meeting: Article 1: Amend Zoning By-Law – Outdoor Seating.</u>

Mr. Block noted the Planning Director sent a further revision today. There are existing regulations on temporary outdoor seating. This is opening it up to all eat-in restaurants with waiter/waitress service. The changes have been added to paragraphs k-o. The use table needs to be modified where this use was previously permitted and is not allowed for all restaurants. Ms. McKnight suggested the numbering and paragraphs be modified.

Upon a motion made by Mr. Jacobs, and seconded by Ms. McKnight, it was by a roll call vote of the four members present unanimously:

VOTED: to recommend adoption of the Outdoor Seating Article in the form presented with minor numerical changes recommended by Ms. McKnight.

Review of applications received for two at-large appointments for the Housing Plan 2021 and vote to appoint.

Mr. Block stated he received a thoughtful review of the applicants from Mr. Alpert. Ms. McKnight stated they have not identified who would chair this group. She and Ms. Espada would like to help each other with this committee, and she suggested Ms. Espada who is comfortable with meetings. Ms. Espada asked if they could be co-chairs as they complement each other. Mr. Block felt that was fine. After discussion it was decided Ms. Espada and Ms. McKnight would co-chair the committee. Mr. Block suggested they should be appointed as co-chairs of the committee. Mr. Jacobs commented he was uncomfortable that people may object. He feels they should first be appointed as members of the committee.

Upon a motion made by Mr. Jacobs, and seconded by Mr. Block, it was by a roll call vote of the four members present unanimously:

VOTED: to nominate Ms. Espada and Ms. McKnight as members of the Housing Plan 2021 Committee.

Mr. Jacobs stated at the first meeting people should be told this is a Planning Board Committee and the Planning Board would run the Committee.

Upon a motion made by Mr. Jacobs, and seconded by Mr. Block, it was by a roll call vote of the four members present unanimously:

VOTED: to appoint Ms. Espada and Ms. McKnight as Co-Chairs of the Housing Plan 2021 Committee.

Mr. Jacobs stated it would have been nice to put a face to a resume and ask a few questions. He does not know these people at all. Many of these people look terrific on paper. There is a lot of great background, and he was really impressed. He stated he is only on the Board for 6 more months. This is a great way for these people to get involved. He would be happy to talk to any and all of them. He felt it as really hard to rank these people, but he would give 3 names – Amanda Berman, Emily Cooper and Andrew Cohen. Mr. Block stated Mr. Alpert had the same comments and recommended Ms. Berman and Mr. Cohen as well.

Ms. McKnight agreed with Mr. Jacobs comments, and she feels any 2 would be good on the committee. She would like to work with Oscar Mertz. He is an architect and has been active in Equal Justice Needham. He is a good team member, listens to others, researches and brings back knowledge. She has never met Rhonda Spector but to understand how affordable housing is financed would be wonderful to have. Ms. SpectorShe has a good background and knows how state agencies work and the funding. PLANNING ARTICLE C: FLOOD PLAIN OR WATERSHED PROTECTION DISTRICTS

Amend Article 1B. DEFINITIONS and Article 14B. FLOOD PLAIN OR WATERSHED PROTECTION DISTRICTS to conform with FEMA Map updates and adopt, as appropriate, provisions of the Massachusetts 2020 Model Floodplain Bylaws.

PLANNING ARTICLE D: DEFINITION OF CHILD CARE FACILITY

Amend the definitions of Child Care Facility, Child Care Use, and Home Occupation in Sections 1B DEFINITIONS Section 14J SMART GROWTH OVERLAY DISTRICT and Section 14.J.1 WELLESLEY PARK SMART GROWTH OVERLAY DISTRICT to reference the terms used in G.L. c.15D Section 1A.

<u>Home Occupation</u> – A non-residential use of a dwelling unit, by the resident or residents, for gainful employment, that is subordinate but compatible to residential use. The term Home

Occupation shall include a "family child care home" as defined in G.L. c.15D Section 1A., for not more than six children, including participating children living in the residence, where the provider is licensed by the Department of Early Education and Care under G.L. c. 15D.

PLANNING ARTICLE E: TOWN HOUSE

1. Amend Section 1B DEFINITIONS, by amending or inserting the following definitions as follows:

<u>Duplex</u> – A building containing two Dwelling Units joined side by side [or front to back] sharing a common wall for all or substantially all of its height and depth; that is in which no part of one Dwelling Unit is over any other part of the other Dwelling Unit. A duplex shall be considered as one principal building occupying one lot for the purposes of determining yard requirements.

<u>Town House</u> – A One-Unit Dwelling constructed in a group of three or more attached Dwelling Units in which each Dwelling Unit extends from foundation to roof and with a yard or public way on not less than two sides.

<u>Townhouse Structure</u> – a row of at least three One-Unit Dwellings whose sidewalls are separated from each other Dwelling Units by a fire separation wall or walls, and where each Dwelling Unit has its own at-grade access.

<u>Two Unit Dwelling</u> – A building, including a Duplex, containing two, and no more than two, Dwelling Units.

2. Amend Section 4 GENERAL RESIDENCE DISTRICTS to incorporate the revised definitions.

PLANNING ARTICLE F: SUSTAINABILITY

- 1. Amend Section 1. GENERAL PROVISIONS by amending Section 1.C Purpose to add a new Section 1.C.12 as follows:
 - 12. To reduce emissions of greenhouse gases and to encourage the use of sustainable building and land use practices.
- 2. Amend Section 16A. PROJECT APPROVAL to include review of Greenhouse Gas Emissions by:
 - a. Amending Section 16A.C.3.a and Section 16A.C.3.b to read as follows:
 - a. The applicant shall submit to the Planning Board a Municipal Systems Impact Analysis (MSIA), prepared by professional engineers registered in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts, and identifying the impact of the Construction Project on water, sewer, storm drainage, electric, traffic, intersections, sidewalks and footways, building occupant life safety, refuse disposal and recycling, and greenhouse gas emissions. The water, sewer, and storm drainage portions of the MSIA shall be prepared by engineers having expertise in civil engineering; the electric portion shall be prepared by engineers having expertise in electrical engineering; the traffic and pedestrian safety and bicycle safety portions shall be prepared by engineers having expertise in traffic and transportation engineering; and the greenhouse gas emissions portion shall be prepared by engineers having expertise in energy performance and efficiency.
 - b. The intent of the analysis is to determine the impact on the Town's existing capital infrastructure in order to assess costs of providing or upgrading Town public facilities

which will benefit a PSI and compatibility with the Town's greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals.

- b. Amending Section 16A.C.3.c to add a new subsection vi as follows:
 - vi. Greenhouse Gas Emissions

identification of proposed energy consumption and emissions including analysis of measures taken to meet the Town's greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals.

- 3. Amend Section 22. DESIGN REVIEW to expand the Design Review Standards to include review of sustainable design by adding a new Section 22.C.6 as follows:
 - 6. Sustainable Design- Proposed development shall promote meeting the Town's greenhouse gas emissions reduction goals.
- 4. Amend Section 1B DEFINITIONS by inserting the following definition:

<u>Heat Pump</u> – Means a Cold Climate Air-Source Heat Pump which is listed by the Massachusetts Clean Energy Center at https://goclean.masscec.com/wp-content/uploads/2021/01/MassCEC_ASHP_GUIDE.pdf or, if such listing is discontinued, a successor or comparable listing as confirmed by the Planning Department.

5. Amend Section 19 YARD REGULATIONS by amending the fourth sentence of the Section 19.B to read in its entirety as follows:

Heating, ventilation, air conditioning, swimming pool, electric generating, or other noise emitting equipment shall not be located in required setback areas except for Heat Pumps which are attached to and do not extend more than two feet from the wall of the building (but may not be attached to any part of bay windows) or are ground mounted and do not extend more than four feet from the foundation of the building, including any pad on which the Heat Pump is mounted. Plans and installation of sound reduction and/or visual screening may be required if, in the opinion of the Inspector of Buildings abutters may be affected.

PLANNING ARTICLE G: ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS

Add a new Section 16H. ACCESSORY DWELLING UNITS to allow the construction and operation of Accessory Dwelling Units in One-Unit Dwellings.

PLANNING ARTICLE H: COMMERCIAL GUN SHOPS

1. Amend Section 1B DEFINITIONS by inserting the following definition:

Commercial Gun Shop – Any commercial establishment engaging in whole or in part in the business of a Gunsmith, or the manufacture, sale, or lease to the public of any Weapon, Machine Gun, Ammunition, Bump Stock, Large Capacity Feeding Device, Stun Gun, or Trigger Crank, as such terms are defined in G.L.c.140, § 121.

- 2. Amend Section 11. BUSINESS DISTRICTS by adding a new Section 11.A.13.l as follows:
 - I. Commercial Gun Shop

- 3. Amend Section 13. INDUSTRIAL DISTRICTS by adding a new Section 13.A.11.d as follows:
 - d. Commercial Gun Shop
- 4. Amend Section 25. SPECIAL PERMIT GRANTING AUTHORITY by inserting a new Section 25.B.7 to to regulate the siting, design, placement, security, safety, monitoring, and modifications of Commercial Gun Shops within the Town to ensure that such uses are operated in a manner consistent with the overall health, welfare and safety of the Town and to minimize the adverse impacts of Commercial Gun Shops on adjacent properties, residential neighborhoods, schools and other places where children congregate, and other land uses potentially incompatible with said Commercial Gun Shops.
 - b. Compatibility with State and Federal Laws and Regulations The Zoning Bylaw

PLANNING ARTICLE I: OUTDOOR LIGHTING

- 1. Amend Section 16G.D to read in its entirety as follows:
 - D. Applicability

The provisions of this Section shall apply to the following project types:

- 1. Major Construction Projects and Minor Construction Projects; and
- 2. Externally Illuminated Signs requiring Design Review and/or a Special Permit, as required and defined by Section 22A.

Where the provisions of this Section 16G are more specific and/or more restrictive with respect to lighting associated with an applicable project type for which other standards may exist within the Zoning Bylaw, the regulations contained in this Section shall take precedence.

With respect to any building or structure which is constructed or renovated as part of a Major Construction Project or a Minor Construction Project, all exterior luminaires of such building or structure shall be brought into compliance with this Section 16G.

The provisions of this Section shall not apply to:

- (a) One-Unit or Two-Unit Dwellings or to structures or uses accessory to such dwellings.
- (b) the ordinary maintenance, repair, and/or replacement of luminaires not approved as part of and/or associated with the installation of Externally Illuminated Signs; and
- (c) the installation of new luminaires on properties not subject to one or more of the aforementioned project types following the effective date of this Section.

PLANNING ARTICLE J: SIGNS

Amend Section 22A. SIGNS as follows:

In Table 22A.1 insert the words ", whichever is less." at the end of the text in the cell in such table for Wall Signs, Maximum Area, Commercial Districts Fronting Streets other than Worcester Street and

Commercial Districts Fronting Worcester Street, so that the text in such cell shall read in its entirety as follows:

Additional signs allowed per additional public entrances and additional signs allowed for building occupied by more than 1 Business Establishment, shall not exceed 25 sq. ft. or 10% of the area of the wall to which attached, whichever is less.

PLANNING ARTICLE K: ZONING BYLAW REORGANIZATION

Amend the Zoning Bylaw to reorder and renumber existing sections to correct all section references therein to conform to the new section references.
