Update on COVID-19 From the Town of Needham and Needham Public Health

April 21, 2020 – The Town of Needham and Needham Public Health today provided the following update regarding COVID-19.

State DPH COVID-19 Numbers

The Massachusetts Department of Public Health is reporting that as of April 21, 2020 there are:

- 41,199 cases statewide
- 4,062 cases Norfolk County
- 1,961 deaths statewide
- 114 cases in Needham (as reported by DPH on 4/15)

Governor Closes Schools for the Remainder of the School Year, Requires Remote Learning

Governor Baker announced today that public and private schools across Massachusetts will remain closed for the rest of the school year, and that students and teachers will engage in remote learning until the conclusion of the academic year. How to Properly Wear and Care for Your Homemade Mask

Lots of people are learning to make their own homemade masks or are now wearing those made by friends and family. To make sure you're wearing the mask properly and to keep it in good condition, here are a few important tips:

- 1) Put your name on it. Don't share!
- 2) If your mask has pleats, pull the top and bottom parts of the mask apart to enlarge it
- 3) Put the elastic around your ears
- 4) If your mask has a wire in the top seam, mold the top of the mask to fit your nose and cheeks.
- 5) **Your mask should cover your nose and mouth at all times**

How to remove the mask after wearing it:

- 1) Wash hands thoroughly.
- 2) Be very careful! Remove by the elastic. Do not touch the outside of the mask. Imagine it is covered in glitter that you don't want to get all over you or scattered about the house. Remove mask. Place face down on paper towel
- 4) Put mask in hot wash.
- 5) Wash hands again thoroughly
- 6) After hot wash: hot dryer and hot iron to refresh

Your mask should be washed after every time you wear it.

NOTE: Homemade masks are not FDA approved. They will not completely protect you from COVID-19. They provide light protection and remind you not to touch your face. They also help prevent the spread of germs from you to others. Your mask protects others. The masks of others protect you.
